

The Mayflower Primary School Sport Premium - 2024 & 2025

The Mayflower Primary School continues to use its PE and Sport Premium funding to deliver high-quality, inclusive physical education and broaden opportunities for all pupils.

CPD / Training

Following feedback from PE drop-in sessions and informal discussions, all teachers were provided with a minimum of 12 hours tailored, hands-on CPD with Ben Gale (Tiny Rugby School). Over the course of the year, Ben Gale delivered over 180 hours of training. While this training was tailored to the needs of each teacher, the overarching theme was team games - focusing on attacking and defending.

Staff have reported being more confident in teaching PE, which in turn has impacted our long-term planning. This demonstrates the sustainability of this initiative.

The intensive focus on developing staff confidence was a result of recent research findings - supported by the aforementioned peer communication. A recent government (OFSTED supported) research project (Leveling The Playing Field: The Physical Education Subject Report - 2023) found that fewer than half of primary teachers are confident in delivering PE lessons.

The PE lead attended both in-person and online training into PE delivery and PE leadership.

Our school sports coach attended in-person training, focusing upon local opportunities and networking.

Two PE staff meetings were carried out for both classroom teachers and LPSAs. We have subsequently had a higher uptake of support staff volunteering to run after-school sports clubs.

The payment of annual subscriptions for PE planning - including EYFS.

Internal Events & Extra Curricular Activities

Equipment was purchased to improve Sports Day. Following pupil voice, 2 new activities were introduced this year.

New equipment and trophies were purchased to improve our three annual in-house competitions. These events allow ALL pupils to partake in at least one cross year-group event (dodgeball, hockey and scatterball).

Equipment was purchased to expand the variety of afterschool and lunchtime clubs available to pupils - which are offered free of charge. In an attempt to provide more opportunities for previously disadvantaged pupils, we purchased... football equipment (specifically for girls), five dartboard sets and an array of balls (appropriate for SEND pupils).

Over the course of the year, we host 47 after-school clubs - a record number. This provided over 750 spaces for pupils to develop skills, embed our school virtues, and foster a life-long love of sport and physical activity. Of these pupils, 41% were female - a previous area of development identified within our completion of the School Games Mark.

Additional darts equipment was purchased to facilitate an end of year six event - which was overseen by Bobby George.

Catch-Up swimming sessions were provided for year six pupils who were unable to confidently swim 25 metres. These intensive sessions (hosted at a pop-up pool) enabled an additional 31 pupils to achieve the three curriculum objectives.

External Events / Opportunities

Sports Premium money was used to help fund a school minibus - this allowed us to participate in 68 external events. In total, 198 DIFFERENT pupils represent the school at sport - this equates to over half of the pupils in the school.

Sports Premium money allowed us to enter teams into ALL of the inclusion events put on by our local school games organiser. We also attended 2 Pentathlon events - one of which was hosted at the London Aquatic Centre.

A 'second team' kit was purchased. During the previous year, there were several instances when two Mayflower teams were competing against each other at external sporting events - resulting in a clash of kit. To overcome this issue, we purchased an alternative kit.

We attended two weekend spectator events - focused on providing cultural capital for target groups of pupils. We took 13 year 5 & 6 pupils on a football tour of Wembley Stadium - a

majority of whom were PPG pupils. We also attended a female netball game at The Copper Box (London). This event provided 13 KS2 pupils the opportunity to witness live, world class sport.

Swimming and Water Safety Outcomes.

69% of year six pupils achieved the following NC swimming objectives.

- swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres
- use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke and breaststroke]
- perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations

72% of pupils can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres.
